# Loran Scholars make a difference

The world expanded for Chedi when he applied for the Loran Award. “The application itself is a hugely rewarding process,” he says, describing it as an opportunity to reflect on past contributions and imagine paths he could follow.


After being named a Loran Scholar, Chedi’s exploration began with a move from Toronto to Fredericton to attend UNB. His early experiences as a scholar have fuelled him to broaden and deepen his impact through meaningful service and leadership.


In his first year, he volunteered with Big Brothers Big Sisters, participated in the 2018 G7 Ministerial Meeting, and spent his public policy Loran summer at Calgary Economic Development. Now in his second year studying Geodesy and Geomatics Engineering, he is taking on new challenges as a residence proctor.

The Loran community grounds him on his journey. “I can’t express how greatly it has affected my life - the amount of personal growth I have undergone in the past year, the support that I’ve received, and the great people I have met.” He feels uplifted by the vast network of people driving each other to reach their potential.

Chedi acknowledges the unique importance of mentors in his life. “They’ve encouraged me to take leaps that I otherwise would have been afraid to take,” he says. “They modelled what I could be.” His gratitude for the financial and personal support he has received pushes him to be a positive role model for others: “Whatever I do, I want to pay it forward.”

# INVESTING IN THE GREATEST OF CANADA'S NATURAL RESOURCES: OUR YOUTH



LORAN, short for Long-Range Aid to Navigation, is a system that uses three points to determine one's course for a long journey. The Loran Scholars Foundation identifies and supports young people who demonstrate our three core values: character, service, and leadership. Loran Scholars navigate future paths of high potential, guided by these values.

We believe in finding and nurturing the next generation of leaders of character: young people who act with integrity, courage, compassion, determination, and a high level of personal autonomy. Canada will thrive if we ensure that high-potential students are given the opportunity to imagine, explore, and create the future.



## Long-Term Investment in Potential

Loran Scholars are provided with a launchpad to realize their potential as future leaders for Canada. Our scholars are encouraged to resist the temptation to take easy or conventional paths and seek out how they will most effectively contribute to Canadian society. Each Loran Scholar is granted a renewable four-year award valued at up to \$100,000, comprising an annual \$10,000 living stipend and a matching tuition waiver from one of our 25 partner universities. Scholars are provided with up to \$10,000 in funding for three scholar-initiated summer internships (enterprise, public policy, and community development) facilitating practical tri-sectoral work experience. Scholars are paired with mentors who challenge them and introduce them to their new communities. Loran Scholars use these opportunities to broaden and enrich their academic studies and develop their leadership capabilities.

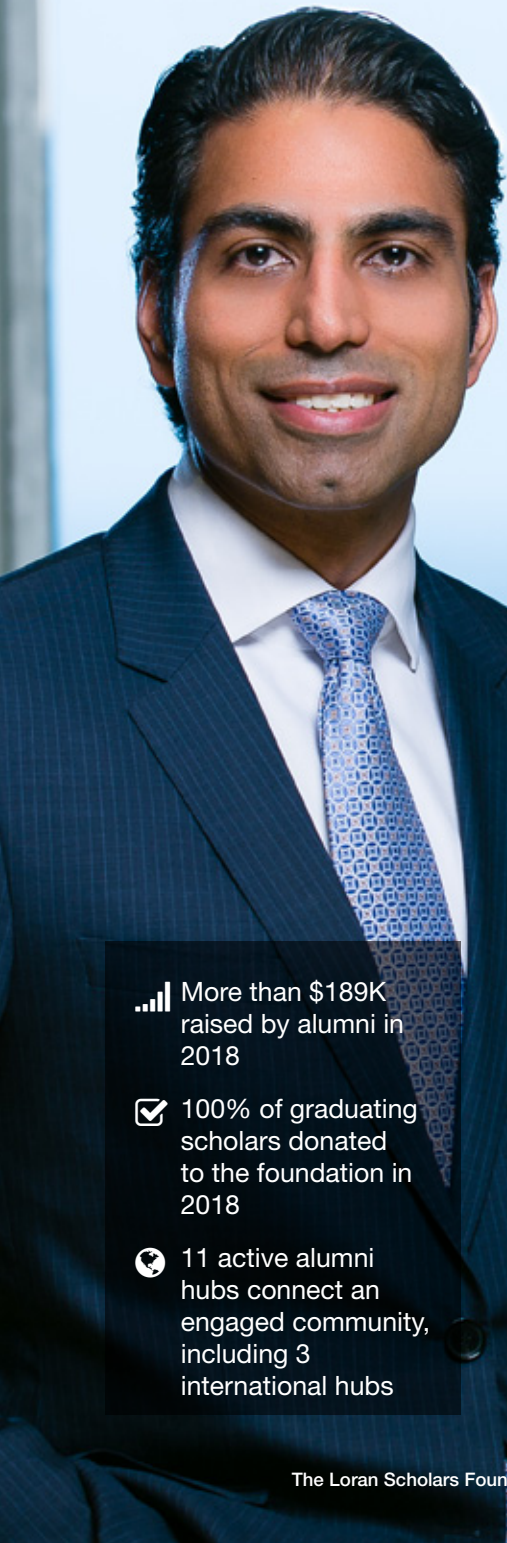
## Rigorous and Comprehensive Selection Process

We look for qualities in our scholars that a transcript alone cannot show: personal integrity and character; commitment to service and an entrepreneurial spirit; breadth in academic and extra-curricular interests; strongly developed inner-directedness; and outstanding overall potential for leadership. Through a series of assessments and interviews, we select up to 34 Loran Scholars from over 5,000 applicants. We also grant up to 104 one-time entrance awards to provincial and national finalists annually.

## Extensive Network

We understand the value of connection and relationships for supporting scholars' future successes and welcome them into an extended family of volunteers, donors, staff, and past and present scholars. Incoming Loran Scholars forge strong bonds by spending seven days together in Algonquin Park as part of an orientation expedition before beginning university. All in-stream scholars participate in an annual four-day retreat, forums, and a transition program during their graduating year. Our alumni come together and collaborate through their own regional hubs and larger reunion events. Our Loran network enables connections to be made across years and disciplines and provides inspiration and motivation for our scholars.





# Loran Alumni make a difference

Gurpreet Brar (W. Garfield Weston Loran Scholar '00) has vivid memories of applying for the Loran Award. "I still feel very humbled that I was selected as a Loran Scholar," he reflects. Gurpreet has stayed connected with the foundation as an interviewer and alumni hub coordinator in Winnipeg. He says, "It is a lifelong privilege and honour to be a Loran Scholar and alumnus, and a collective responsibility to try to leave everything around us better than we found it."

He has tried to live out this mindset. While knocking on doors as school trustee candidate in 2010, Gurpreet met a Mennonite pastor and discussed interfaith dialogue. Though he came up short in the race, the two began organizing the Greenway garden, a multi-faith initiative between the local Mennonite congregation and Gurpreet's Sikh gurdwara. He observes, "When we push ourselves outside our comfort zone and take meaningful risks, sometimes it may not turn out as planned, but you never know what positive outcomes may result." The two communities continue to nurture mutual respect and common ground.

With shared values as a common thread amongst alumni, Gurpreet says he is continually inspired by the community's positive energy and excited by the long-term potential. "Given it is still a relatively young organization, imagine the impact Loran alumni will be having across Canada and globally fifty years from now."

Our scholars share a lifetime commitment to the values at the heart of Loran: character, a dedication to service, and the courage to lead.

The average age of our 506 alumni is only 30. Despite their youth, Loran alumni are taking on challenging leadership roles and tackling complex problems in every sector.

Throughout the year, alumni remain connected to Loran as volunteers, lending their time and expertise to the foundation as assessors, selection committee administrators and interviewers, mentors, and fourth-year transition coaches.

The annual alumni campaign is a significant financial contribution to the foundation and an important measure of how deeply invested alumni are to the future generations of scholars. This past year, 79% of alumni contributed to the campaign and all donations were generously matched dollar-for-dollar by the McCall MacBain Foundation as a contribution to our endowment.

Our alumni hubs network connects past scholars, encouraging one another to live the values of Loran. This year we launched three international hubs in New York City, San Francisco, and London and, with the addition of our most recent Saskatoon hub, we now reach two-thirds of our alumni through our 11 hubs. Each hub engages alumni through social, professional, and service-oriented gatherings. As the Loran alumni population grows, almost doubling by 2027, the hubs serve as intimate networks that support alumni as they contribute their talents to Canada and the world.

# DEVELOPING LEADERS OF IMPACT

Loran alumni are giving back to their communities and pushing boundaries in such fields as technology, the arts, finance, medicine, law, and science. Though their work is strikingly diverse, they share Loran's core values of character, service, and leadership.



**Jay Potter** (Scotiabank Loran Scholar '02) serves as Crown Counsel with Public Prosecution Service of Canada, based in Yellowknife, NWT. He launched his career in the federal government with the Treasury Board and has held positions at Department of Justice Canada, where he was part of the core team of government lawyers who advised and developed Canada's landmark medical assistance in dying legislation. Jay is the Chair of the Institute of Public Administration of Canada - IPAC (NWT Region) and served on the boards of the Canadian Red Cross, Eastern Ontario, and Toronto Regions.



**Jenna Gall** (W. Garfield Weston Loran Scholar '10) serves as the Community Energy Project Manager at First Nations Power Authority in Saskatoon and is committed to advancing renewable energy projects to power Indigenous reconciliation. Named one of the The Starfish Canada's Top 25 Environmentalists Under 25 in 2016, she spent several years designing, installing, and managing solar projects and is a founding director of the international Youth Arctic Coalition. Jenna received her BSc in Environmental Science from UBC Okanagan and is currently an MES candidate and renewable energy researcher at the University of Saskatchewan.



**Kai Cheng Thom** (BMO Loran Scholar '09) is a writer, performer, and practicing psychotherapist and social worker at Central Toronto Youth Services. Author of *Fierce Femmes and Notorious Liars: A Dangerous Trans Girl's Confabulous Memoir*, a play called *No Homeland* and *From the Stars in the Sky to the Fish in the Sea*, among other works, Kai Cheng has been published widely on the topics of race, gender, and mental health. She is the winner of several literary prizes (including the 2017 Dayne Ogilvie Prize for LGBTQ Emerging Writers) and served as keynote speaker for Rebel Knowledge, a social and environmental justice symposium hosted by Ontario Public Interest Research Group in 2018.

**Dr. Kosar Khwaja** (Loran Scholar '94) is a team physician for the NHL Montréal Canadiens and Associate Professor of Surgery at McGill University. As Director of Acute Care Surgery and Associate Director of the Trauma Program at McGill University Health Centre, he has been active in Montreal's hospital network redevelopment to predict resource allocation. Dr. Khwaja works internationally as a partner at an emergency care consulting firm and as an emergency responder, and has served as a special consultant to the National Office of Health Emergency Response Team, the Health Emergency Response Readiness Review Committee, the OERS Working Group on Ventilator Stockpile and the Vancouver Olympics Mobile Medical Unit Committee.





# IDENTIFYING EXCEPTIONAL OVERALL PROMISE



We believe that a young person's character is a better indicator of overall potential than standard academic measures. Our rigorous selection process includes a written assessment, as well as individual and panel interviews with a diverse group of Canadian leaders.

To find these young people, we enlist the help of guidance counsellors and teachers at 3,500 high schools and Cegeps across the country. They recommend candidates who best demonstrate strength of character, commitment to service in the community, and leadership potential. In addition, over half of our candidates apply independently through the direct pool.

In 2017/18, we expanded our selections network by adding six new regional committees (including a new francophone committee in Sherbrooke and a virtual committee for the three northern territories) and one additional national committee, enabling us to provide more students with an interview experience.

In February 2018, the top 88 candidates attended our national selections weekend in Toronto, where eight committees and four national co-chairs selected 34 Loran Scholars – our largest cohort yet. In 2018, the weekend was enhanced with enrichment programming to help prepare all finalists for the transition to university. To expand our reach to even more students, we increased the number and value of one-time entrance awards and granted 54 finalist awards (valued at \$5,000, up from \$3,000) and 50 provincial awards (valued at \$2,000).

# Loran Mentors make a difference

Carolina Gallo believes that mentorship is about “aspiration, inspiration, exploration.” Loran mentors, she says, are beacons to guide Loran Scholars as they grow into their potential as leaders. As a Montreal-based mentor for McGill Loran Scholars Talitha Calder ('09) and now Blair Crawford ('17), she appreciates that Loran's values are in alignment with her own and acknowledges that mentoring relationships support the wellbeing of both people.


“Mentoring is a growth path,” she explains, emphasizing the benefits and insights that come with investing time and effort as a mentor. She maintains that mentors have as much to gain as they have to give mentees on a shared path of continuous learning.

On the impact of her Loran mentorship experience, Blair notes, “Carolina actively challenges me as an individual. In every discussion we have, she pushes me to question my own preconceptions. I leave every conversation with her with a new and advanced perspective.”

Carolina recognizes the transformative power of mentorship, likening it to a circular economy. Loran, she says, finds Canada's future leaders and pairs them with business and community leaders in mentoring relationships. Eventually, these next-generation leaders re-enter the cycle as mentors themselves. This culture of giving, she believes, “is the core of sustainability.”

# EXPERIENTIAL LEARNING AND DISCOVERY

Summer work experiences emphasize tri-sectoral leadership, expanding scholars' understanding of Canada, the world, and themselves. Our summer program complements scholars' academic studies, providing up to \$10,000 in funding to facilitate professional skill-building through practical work experience in the public, private, and non-profit sectors. Each scholar gains experience in policy creation during their public policy summer, explores grassroots non-profit work in their community development summer, and develops their capacity to work in a for-profit environment through their enterprise summer.

When **Erin Knight** (Scace Loran Scholar '15) left Gilbert Plains, MB, to begin her studies at the University of Calgary, she didn't realize that she would graduate with a completely different perspective on how she could create a positive impact. Now finishing her degree in Development Studies with a certificate in Sustainability, she has explored these possibilities through her Loran summers. "I have learned how important it is to be able to integrate knowledge from all three sectors," Erin explains.

For her public policy summer, Erin worked with OpenMedia in Vancouver to advocate for free and open internet access. She researched the state of internet and cell phone data caps in Canada for a report that was brought forward to the CRTC. Her policy experience kindled a professional interest in digital access, particularly in rural communities.

During her community development summer, Erin worked in Singapore with Humanitarian Organisation for Migration Economics (HOME). She assisted with individual casework and women's shelter intake, accompanied shelter resident outings, and supported HOME's communications and skill-building academy. She says that her time abroad emphasized the importance of adaptability, open-mindedness, and cultural empathy.

Erin's enterprise summer challenged her to explore how she can contribute in a for-profit environment. As part of the Strategic Coordination office at ATB Financial in Calgary, she researched KPIs and metrics for strategic goals and helped create strategic plan tracking tools. Her previous summer experiences in digital advocacy and community development culminated in her ATB capstone project: designing a program for the company to address the digital divide in Alberta.

Reflecting on Loran's summer program, Erin now believes that her ability to create change lies in uniting her understanding of how problems are solved in each sector and finding ways to draw from her experiences in each of them. "It taught me how I can learn to provide value no matter where I am," she says.

**Faris Mecklai** (Loran Scholar '17) worked with the **Yukon Conservation Society**, a grassroots environmental NGO in Whitehorse focusing on advocacy, research, and education. He conducted research on the success of recovery strategies for species at risk in the Yukon, contributed to the development of a new territory wetlands protection policy, assisted with youth educational programming, and participated in public-engagement policy discussions.



**London, UK | Public Policy**  
**Aditi Sriram** (Scace Loran Scholar '16) worked as a public policy intern with **Doctors of the World**. She worked on a policy brief as the head researcher, investigating data about service users who potentially had cancer and outlining systemic issues that proved to be an obstacle for accessing healthcare. She also assisted the policy team with data analysis for the organization's annual report.

**Ford Smith** (McCall MacBain Loran Scholar '17) worked as **Iris Automation's** business development intern, under the leadership of CEO **Alex Harmesen** ('10) and Head of Business Development **Grace McKenzie** ('11). Ford conducted market research, developed marketing strategies, and secured new customers. He also contributed to projects for American and Canadian pilot programs designed to accelerate safe Unmanned Aircraft Systems integration and make compelling cases for the adoption of drone technology.



**Cali, Colombia | Community Development**  
**Jérémie Bedard** (Dobson Loran Scholar '17) worked as a software developer for **Lúdicamente**, an initiative introducing elementary students to the principles of mental health. He developed a mobile application that will test the critical thinking of 14,000 students and gather data for local government policy-making. He also performed data analysis to help identify the needs of high-risk student groups.



**Vancouver, British Columbia | Enterprise**  
 At **VanCity Credit Union**, **Somaya Amiri** (McCall MacBain Loran Scholar '15) created policy and procedures for the business technology platform used to provide small business loans, and summarized data for a new onboarding process for small businesses. She led group members and conducted primary research to deepen understanding of financial and social issues faced by youth from marginalized communities.



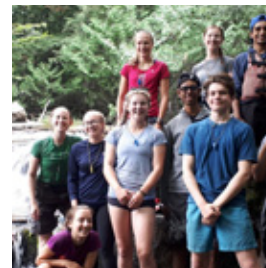
**London, Ontario | Community Development**  
**Sayeh Yousefi** (Loran Scholar '16) spent the summer with the **Chippewas of the Thames First Nation**. She worked on an economic diversification strategy to address high poverty rates and low economic livelihood, particularly for women and youth. She also worked at a local youth centre helping with programs to keep kids active and connected to their culture.





## Building Community

With 123 scholars currently studying at 18 different universities across the country, we believe in the value of building a community of young Canadians who inspire and motivate each other. To facilitate this, our incoming class embarks together on an orientation expedition, and we bring in-stream scholars together for an annual retreat, regional events, and our national scholars' forum.



### ORIENTATION EXPEDITION

For the tenth year, through the generous support of Nancy and Bob Young, the incoming class of Loran Scholars participated in an Outward Bound orientation expedition. The week-long excursion into Algonquin Park encouraged scholars to push their limits through teamwork, physical challenges, and risk-taking. This experience builds a shared sense of identity as Loran Scholars before they disperse across Canada to begin their first semester of university.



### SCHOLARS' RETREAT

In August, in-stream scholars gathered for peer-to-peer learning, personal development, and reflection. Scholars created and led the weekend's programming with presentations on topics including the transition to first year, anti-oppression training, consent and sexual violence, mental health, service on- and off-campus, developing authentic mentorship relationships, and making the most of the summer program. Esha Bhandari ('01), Samuel Breau ('05), Marin MacLeod ('09), Alex Mazer ('97), and Mark Schaan ('97) joined us to impart knowledge, offer perspectives, and communicate how Loran values have guided both their professional and personal paths.



### FOURTH-YEAR TRANSITION PROGRAM

Our fourth-year transition program is designed to help scholars plan for next steps following their undergraduate studies. In August, in advance of the retreat, fourth-year scholars came together for a day of programming and meetings with coaches. Throughout the year, scholars are matched with alumni and community and business leaders from our extensive network to help them make choices during this critical time in their growth.



### SCHOLARS' FORUM

In February, first- and fourth-year scholars attended the annual Scholars' Forum. This gathering provides an opportunity to celebrate and connect the newest and graduating classes. Dr. Gary Warner, former Director of the Arts & Sciences Program at McMaster University, spoke to first-year scholars about living a life of community service, while fourth-year scholars received assessments from The McQuaig Institute. First-year scholars benefited from résumé support from BMO human resources specialists and attended a session on securing a job with Patrick David ('99).

Fellow alumni led a panel conversation for fourth-year scholars on transitioning out of undergraduate studies. Additional highlights of the forum included a session on public policy and a workshop on financial planning after graduation.

# Loran Volunteers make a difference

Gary's first experience as a Loran volunteer was in 2008, when he became a mentor for Siobhan Stewart ('08). In 2011, he began volunteering as an interviewer and has been part of Loran's Regional and National Selections ever since. As an interviewer, he focuses on drawing out the potential of well-rounded students and encourages them to consider how they can provide value through service. He says, "I go home from the interviews inspired by having contact with so many young people who are the future."

Not only does he find it fulfilling to connect with youth demonstrating character, service, and leadership, he adds, "It is also a great joy to work with the members of the interviewer teams." He notes that interviewers grow along with the students: "You develop skills and learn from the process."

On ten years of volunteering with remarkable young people, Gary reflects on Loran's impact: "It is such an admirable incubator of talent for service in many different sectors of Canadian life. Anything we can do to participate in that process is a privilege."

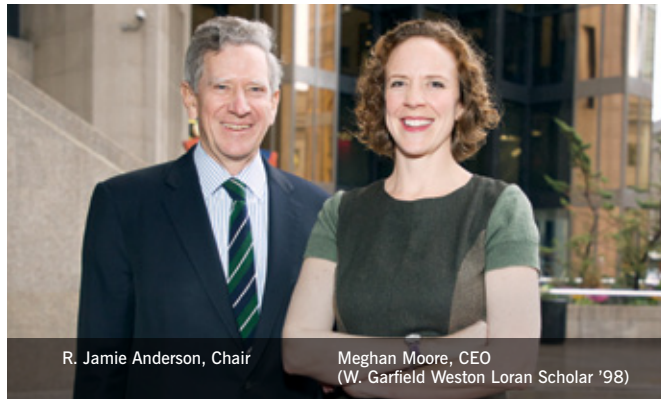

# THE YEAR IN REVIEW

## LETTER FROM THE CHAIR AND CEO

2017/18 marked a year of growth and transition for the Loran Scholars Foundation. As departing CEO Franca Gucciardi ('90) passed the baton, the strength and stability that she built into the foundation over the course of her 13 years of visionary leadership ensured a smooth and seamless changeover. Nancy Young (past Chair) and Catherine Fowler, in her role as interim CEO, also contributed to the success of the transition, and for all their hard work and dedication to Loran, we give sincere thanks.

Before Franca's departure she secured a transformative gift from the McCall MacBain Foundation: \$11.42M in annual matching grants over ten years, which will fuel the growth laid out in our strategic plan in terms of the number of scholars we invest in and the richness of the four-year experience they receive. This gift will also bring us closer to our 2016 – 2021 campaign goal of \$20.3M. We are grateful to John and Marcy McCall MacBain for their belief in Loran's mission.

The selection of our 29th class of Loran Scholars was significant in a number of ways: we saw a record number of applications, expanded our regional selections process, and gave out the largest number of awards to date. Our scholar and alumni stewardship also expanded and deepened this year. We doubled the number of coaching opportunities as part of our scholars' fourth-year transition program and recruited alumni to be summer planning mentors for scholars. We launched three international hubs (San Francisco, New York, London), and already this year have launched a new Canadian hub in Saskatoon. Through these 11 alumni hubs, we create the opportunity for in-person connections with over two-thirds of our 506 alumni.

Our core value of service is shared by our network of 629 volunteers and 671 donors who give back in important ways. We are grateful for this tremendous support – it is fundamental to our search for and cultivation of Canada's next generation of leaders.

As Loran looks toward its fourth decade, we remain rooted in the original vision of our founder, Bob Cluett – to choose character and potential over past achievement and recognize young people, not for what they did do, but for what they will do. At a time when leading with integrity matters more than ever, we remain unique in our approach to identifying young people who possess the capacity to become great leaders. We see ourselves as early-stage investors in the young Canadians who will become value creators, industry disruptors, social change agents, entrepreneurial innovators, and nation-builders. But we're not passive investors. We guarantee our investment with a four-year enrichment program that acts as the launchpad for our scholars' future paths of high potential. With thirty years of investing in Loran Scholars behind us, we look forward to continuing our mission to support the young people who will emerge as Canada's future leaders.

## FINANCIALS

Over the past 13 years, the Loran Scholars Foundation has steadily increased its asset base from \$1.3 million to \$16.1 million. This asset base provides us with the necessary reserve to continue to select up to 34 Loran Scholars every year, knowing that we have sufficient funds to pay out all anticipated stipends to in-stream scholars.

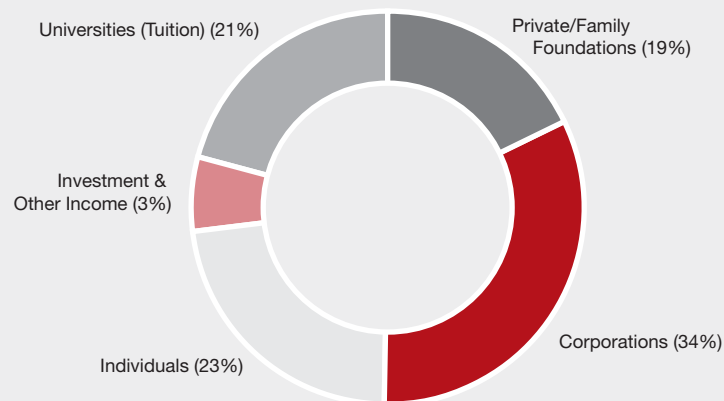

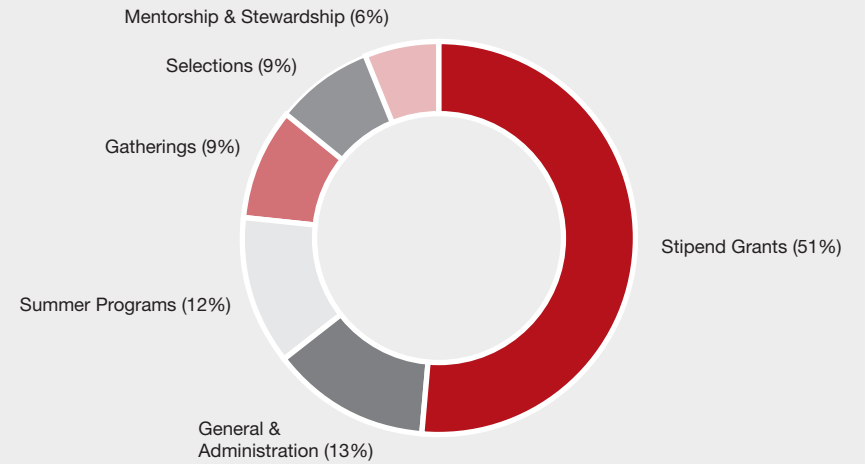
## INCOME

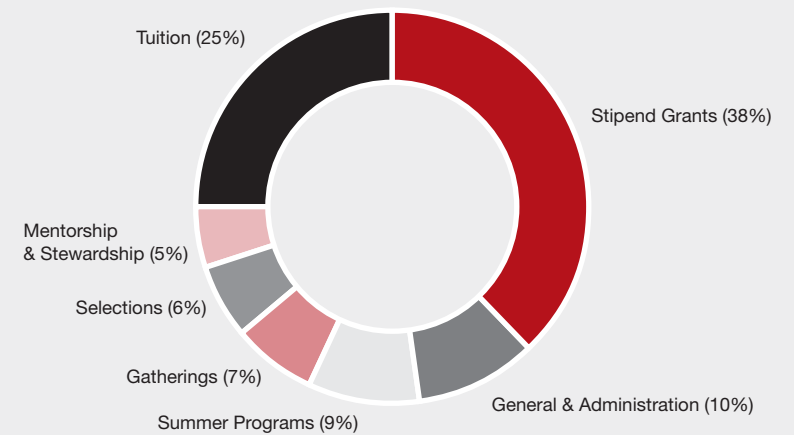


## EXPENDITURES
