Dear Friends,

With this annual report, we invite you to join us in celebrating Loran's 35 years of identifying and nurturing promising young people from across our richly diverse nation. There is no one way to be a Loran Scholar–a truth demonstrated by the myriad ways scholars and alumni make a difference along their varied paths. There is, however, one fundamental commonality that connects all Loran Scholars: values-based leadership.



Our values shape who we are, define our purpose, help us envision who we want to be in the world, and inspire action towards that goal. As Canada's only undergraduate award that puts character and commitment to service above all else when selecting promising candidates, what we are ultimately seeking are values-driven individuals. Young people who imagine a better future and are determined to contribute to making it a reality. Young people who possess the integrity to act in alignment with their core values.

Our founder, Bob Cluett, believed that Loran first needed to find students whose qualities of character made them eager to improve the lives of others, willing to push boundaries, and prepared to pursue their own unique paths. He hypothesized that if we then invested in them, providing a breadth of opportunities to explore, grow, and fully discover their potential, we would ultimately fortify Canada's leadership ecosystem and build a stronger, more values-based society. Thirty-five years later, our alumni community totals more than 600 leaders of integrity who are living proof of Bob's vision.

With our new strategic framework in place, we focused our energy in three key directions this year: identifying the best candidates, enabling their growth, and supporting them with a deep, rich, extended network. We are most proud of our efforts to ensure the Loran opportunity is on the radar of community-engaged youth in every corner of the country. We saw a **38%** increase in our geographic reach and a **15%** increase in the number of unique schools represented in our candidate pool for the 2023/24 application cycle. We also made significant improvements to the scholar experience, piloting a new Leadership Development coaching program to support their growth, and working to address the rising cost of post-secondary education by raising our living stipend and matching tuition waiver. As we look ahead, we are excited to convene the extended Loran alumni network for our quadrennial reunion, Connexion, in the fall of 2024.

In the following pages you will read stories of transformation and impact-trajectories that were shifted because of the steadfast support of our community of donors, volunteers, and partners. Thank you for giving our scholars the motivation and courage to lead in alignment with their values. And thank you for recognizing the value in our collective mission.

This support catalyzes and amplifies young people's growth and impact as Canada's future leaders.

Loran Scholars benefit from:

- Financial support valued at more than \$100,000 over four years, including an annual living stipend, a matching tuition waiver from one of our 25 university partners to access the country's best academic programs, and funding to pursue growth opportunities through the Summer Experiential Learning Program.
- A comprehensive, four-year leadership enrichment program offering skill and capacity building; experiential learning opportunities across the public policy, enterprise, and community development sectors; and immersive learning in Canada and abroad.
- An inspirational community of peers and mentors, providing one-on-one mentorship from a business or community leader; scholar gatherings and community building; and long-term membership in a diverse network of values-driven scholar and alumni peers.

Loran knows that identifying promising young people with the power to create a brighter future means looking beyond grades and other conventional markers of success. Through our in-depth, nationwide selections process, we discover evidence of strength of character, a deep commitment to service, and sparks of exceptional leadership promise.

Experiential Learning

During academic breaks, Loran Scholars gain practical skills in the professional world to which they will one day contribute. The Summer Experiential Learning Program opportunities represent some of their most transformative Loran experiences.

Loran engages with an extensive network of employment partners, supporting scholars to find placements that will best leverage their talents and nurture their growth. In the summer of 2023, scholars worked at **79 organizations** in **11 countries** across **5 continents**. Whether spent in Canada or abroad, Loran summers provide scholars with greater breadth and understanding of the intersections between three major economic sectors and the role each plays within the local, national, and global community.

For my **community development** summer, I worked on policy research and knowledge mobilization for workplace diversity, equity, and inclusion at the Newfoundland-Labrador Federation of Cooperatives. I also supported their communications, social media, and community events. This internship wouldn't have been possible without funding for Loran's Summer Experiential Learning Program: not-forprofit organizations tend to have smaller budgets and fewer full-time employees, which can make hiring interns difficult.

My position was self-directed, allowing me to practice taking charge of projects, even when I didn't necessarily have significant experience or expertise. Managing a wide variety of projects helped me better understand the transferability of the research skills I honed during my undergraduate degree. By having the freedom to challenge

myself, I discovered a unique strength that will help me be a more effective leader: distilling and presenting complex information in ways "non-experts" can understand.

enable tangible improvements in people's lives. This firsthand experience balancing empathy with technology has equipped me to be a better and more compassionate leader in the future.


Interdisciplinary Center for International Development in Health at the University of Sherbrooke, Beirut, Lebanon



- 96% of alumni have donated a cumulative total of \$2.81M to the foundation.
- 64% of alumni contributed \$226,569 to the 2024 alumni campaign.
- 43% of alumni volunteer with the Foundation.
- 100% of the graduating class of 2020 came together to raise \$2,213.20 to donate back to the Foundation to support future cohorts of scholars.

Whether quiet or loud, Loran Scholars are guided by integrity, embrace diversity, celebrate collaboration, and empower others.





Transforming the Future of E-commerce

Armon Shokravi ('18) and Dhruv Patel ('18) became fast friends after meeting at Loran Nationals. They often bounced business ideas off each other throughout their undergraduate journeys. "When you give highly motivated students who share similar values the opportunity to build genuine connections, there's no telling where those relationships will go. Loran fosters an environment where that can happen," says Armon. In 2020, Armon asked Dhruv to help him find a way to increase revenue for e-commerce businesses while building more meaningful customer relationships. The result was AfterSell, a post-purchase upsell app. "We don't want to upsell for the sake of it; we want to serve consumers products and information that are relevant to them," Dhruv explains. In 2024, AfterSell was acquired by Rokt, a leading

Al-driven e-commerce company. With a current client base of 25,000 brands, Armon and Dhruv are always working to improve efficiency and expand their team of intelligent, humble, and motivated talent while giving back regionally. "We're able to create a lot of jobs in Canada, and as we continue to scale up, we're going to keep doing that."

Reimagining Educational Spaces

From Lindsay Moore's ('06) perspective, many of the current challenges in Indigenous and Northern educational systems stem from the incongruences between Indigenous worldviews and Western educational systems. As an Indigenous educator, she is focused on creating systemic changes that will support Indigenous students and communities in redefining education spaces in ways that work best for them. Lindsay says she has already witnessed positive and exciting changes happening thanks to collaboration and strong partnerships. However, she adds, these changes raise questions about how we define education and what we are

> collectively working toward in terms of its governance. "There are multiple answers, and I am honoured and privileged to work through these questions in a way that I hope has been relevant to communities I have been a part of," she says. "My goals are to move from structured. classroom-type settings to community-led, landbased outdoor educational experiences that are broader. more intentional, and supportive for all people and to see these tangible changes implemented on broader, systemic levels."

Reshaping Conservation at a Continental Scale

As the president and CEO of Birds Canada, the country's only national organization dedicated to bird conservation. Patrick Nadeau ('00) spends his days mobilizing staff and tens of thousands of volunteers to drive action to increase the understanding, appreciation, and conservation of birds. "Birds are reliable indicators of the health of our ecosystems. If you work to protect birds, you're solving many of the biggest environmental issues we face today," he says. With biodiversity loss and climate change among two of the biggest challenges humanity faces this century, Patrick believes that incremental change will not cut it. "I'm humbly trying to add my brick to the structure that is the conservation movement, but I'm also trying to change the architects' plans while I'm at it because existing solutions alone have not been enough." To that end, under Patrick's leadership, Birds Canada recently launched an international initiative called Conserva Aves, working directly with partners in Latin America to create 100 new protected areas totaling at


least two million hectares.
